International News from Julia Marsh

Post-placement assessments are rewarding interviews for social workers as we get to go out and meet with parents who have brought home a new child through international adoption. When I am with new parents they seem like any other parents who marvel at the accomplishments their children have mastered. Parents are in awe at how magical their children are but they seldom talk about the process that joined them. As my work now focuses on the international adoption program within Adoption By Choice, I know how complex a journey these parents underwent in order to bring their child home.

As a social worker with Adoption By Choice, I tend to work on the front-end of parents' journeys, answering questions for potentially new parents and assessing individuals for their home assessment process. New parents on the front end of an international adoption journey are typically excited, hopeful and enthusiastically overwhelmed. When I meet these soon-to-be moms and dads for subsequent interviews during their wait-time (for such things as update assessments or addendums to their home assessments), some of their optimism has fizzled. Many parents are frustrated with the length of time it takes to complete their adoption and stunned over how the numerous layers of bureaucracy impacts their adoption experience. Although these new parents knew intellectually that the process was complex, having this register on an emotional level was something that was unanticipated.

International adoption is complex and every country is unique. New moms and dads who are raised in Canada may falsely assume that bureaucracies in other countries match North American organizational standards. New parents often overlook the role played by Canadian Immigration and Citizenship. There are millions of children in the world who need safety and love, yet, there are policies, regulations and laws that make it impossible to bring these children together with new parents. At times, it is overwhelming for me as a professional, yet I am encouraged by the excited new prospective adoptive parents who are desperately hoping to provide love and nurturing to a child.

Parents who join together with their new child through an international adoption journey are experts. They have developed coping strategies to weather the wait period, and they know how to prioritize the expectations of different bureaucracies. As a social worker, I have learned a great deal from these families. While a few families are happy to be done, many are ready to start the process over again to bring another child into their home! All feel that their child was worth it.

I am organizing an informal meet-and-greet for those parents who have successfully brought a child into the Calgary area through international adoption. I would love to know what worked well for you and where you experienced difficulties along your journey. My hope is to put together an informational package for new adoptive applicants so that they can learn from your expertise. Anyone who is interested, please feel free to call me at (403) 451-2991.

A Note From Sheila...

When Birth Parents Change Their Mind

Yes, it happens. And when it does, adoptive parents will naturally react in disbelief, shock, and anger. Especially if the birth parents have reassured them throughout the planning not to worry; that they will not change their minds. No matter how sure the birth parent seems during the planning stage, some of them are just not prepared for the intensity of grief they feel after the baby is born. Even birthparents that have extensive pre-placement counseling and have built a strong and supportive relationship with the prospective adoptive parents may change their mind after the baby is born.

When the adoptive parent loses a child either before or after taking him/her home, they experience a loss similar to feelings parents have when a baby is stillborn or dies. They don't know how they will ever get through the ten days again or how they could ever trust another birth parent. It doesn't seem "fair" that someone would give you their baby and then take it back. But no one "owes" anyone a child, no matter what promises have been made.

Over the years, we at ABC have witnessed some incredible adoptive parents deal with these situations in a very gracious manner. Initially their grief feels insurmountable, but in time they move past the blaming stage and looking for what went "wrong", to an understanding through their own loss at how painful it is for a birthparent to say good-bye to their baby. They feel blessed to be chosen in the first place and report that the experience reinforced for them how ready they are to be parents. Having a baby in their lives for even a few days, opened up their hearts, and gave them faith that their goal of becoming a family is just one match away.

If the unthinkable happens to you, you are not alone. We are experienced grief counselors and will help you navigate through the healing process. We'll also hook you up with the peer support of adoptive parents who have been through it and moved on to become a family.

Adoption and You

Over the past few months Adoption and You has taken a different shape and we have had the privilege of guest speakers who have contributed by sharing their experiences with adoption.

On March 13, 2008 we were joined by social worker Susan Herman who does contract work for ABC. She talked about her experiences as a birth mother and shared her own heartfelt story. The group learned that birth moms come from all different walks of life, and that building an adoption plan for their child is a difficult and painful process. She also spoke about how important maintaining connections with her daughter has been in her life, and that the relationship between birth parents and adoptive parents is one that takes time and effort to maintain, but that is so important for the child as he/she grows. Thank-you so much Susan for sharing your story with our group.

On April 8, 2008 the topic for Adoption and You was "Pre-Natal Exposure to Drugs and Alcohol". Laura Swift, social worker at ABC and I spoke about some of the research about Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder and Fetal Drug Effect. We were also joined by adoptive mom Debbie Mitchell who spoke about her experiences as a parent adopting a child who may be affected. Debbie spoke about many of the difficult decisions that she and her husband Greg had to make during the process of adopting their daughter. Thank-you so much Debbie for taking the time to talk to our group and sharing your experience of adoption.

On May 7th, 2008 we had our final session of Adoption and You until the fall. We were joined by guest speakers Yvonne and Leigh Borges who were delighted to talk about their recent experience of welcoming their son Benjamin. Yvonne and Leigh have been part of our group (formerly known as Surviving the Wait) since its beginning in January 2007 and expressed their thanks for all the support and friendships that they have gained through this group.

Over the past several months in our group we have joked about "The Call". I've found a poem that I think captures many of the feelings that many awaiting adoptive parents feel during the many months of waiting for "the Call" to come. Hang in there, many families come together that are just meant to be...

A New Book in the Library

It was with delight that I received an email from Patricia Irwin Johnston about 4 months ago letting me know that she had a new book, *Adopting: Sound Choices, Strong Families*. Pat had seen her books listed on ABC's website as resources and wanted us to know that though Adopting After Infertility (originally published in 1992) was out of print, she had taken it upon herself to write *Adopting: Sound Choices, Strong Families*, out of a desire to consolidate current issues in adoption for would-be adoptive parents, adoptive parents and adoption professionals.

Her previous books: Adopting After Infertility, Taking Charge of Infertility and Launching a Baby's Adoption were all well read books in our library and had laid a foundation for us as professionals at ABC, helping us to understand how loss and grief affects everyone in the adoption constellation.

Adopting: Sound Choices, Strong Familes, is a wonderful book not only because it offers the reader many vignettes to underscore a theme but because it is comprehensive in a very reader-friendly and interesting way. The book is divided into four stages—moving the reader through early exploration of adoption as a possibility, through examining 'tough stuff' in looking at adoption as a choice, and the commitment adoption requires and finally through anticipating placement and what the 'real thing' brings.

Each chapter offers the reader opportunities for reflection as well as vignettes that make the journey more than mere words on a page. As well, each of the sixteen chapters has a resource list for further reading or surfing. Readers of *Adopting: Sound Choices, Strong Families* will want to have this book as a resource in their personal libraries because of the wealth of information it provides. Though, as Johnston says in her conclusion, "... in the end, it is also about those birth parents and adoptive families loving one another—whether close or at a distance—respecting the role each has in the lives of the person at the center of it all—a child. May that child love and be loved, twice over". I couldn't agree more.




