A Letter from Ramone...

The seasons change so quickly, only a few of weeks ago we were enjoying the sunshine and unseasonably hot temperatures, and now it looks like winter is only around the corner. But with every change in life comes a new challenge and new opportunity.

September 1st, 2009 marked the 20th anniversary of Adoption By Choice providing service to the community. Although the face of ABC changed in its breadth of services, the core values and service have always remained the same. Adoption By Choice's founder and original Program Director, Carol Lamb, has been a pioneer in establishing open adoption services throughout Alberta. Over the past 20 years ABC has had the privilege of working with hundreds of birth parents and adoptive parents in building adoption plans for children. One of the core values in every adoption plan has been to support birth parents and adoptive families to connect, build relationships and maintain connections. Every adoption plan is unique, and changes over time, but rooted at it's heart, is the best interests of the child. ABC is proud to continue to provide its core service to families with the infant and toddler program for domestic adoption and the international adoption program.

As you will note from our birth announcements, we have continued to be busy with domestic adoption placements throughout 2009. Over the past year Adoption By Choice has placed 30 children in adoptive homes, and 21 children since the new year. We continue to provide counseling to several birth parents across the province to help them to build a plan that is right for their child.

With international adoption we are very aware that the climate is ever changing, yet we find that many families forge ahead in hopes of bringing a child to Canada to provide him/her with more opportunity and a stable family

life. Although the journey can be uncertain and lengthy at times, we celebrate along with each family as they welcome their child home. For those that are in need of the service, we are happy to help with the finalization of their adoption.

As always I am very thankful for our committed staff at Adoption By Choice who work tirelessly in their service to birth parents and families. They continue to be committed to providing high quality service to families in all that they do. I am also thankful for the continued support of the adoptive families and am so delighted to see the joy that their children bring.

Jordy's birthparents, Matt and Jaki and also to Laura for making this experience so amazing.



Nice Genes!

While my husband and I were trying to have a child—first, the "old-fashioned way," and then through fertility treatments—we often talked about what our child would look like. I wanted our baby to inherit Erik's distinctive hazel eyes and thick lashes. Erik hoped our baby would have my smile. I imagined our baby would be a

blend of us— an appealing mix of our best qualities. But over the years, our conversations became briefer, and then they ceased altogether.

One day, soon after another miscarriage, while I was sitting in a restaurant, a woman and her daughter caught my eye. They were both tall, long-limbed, darkhaired, with oval faces and similar features. The mom said something that made her daughter laugh, and they threw back

their heads with the same mannerisms. They belonged to each other. That's what I had wanted, had dreamed of for years. But as I watched the matched pair, I realized it was a dream I'd already begun to give up.

Undergoing rounds of IVF that resulted in failures or miscarriages, and watching the chance of having a biological child grow even slimmer, had shifted my focus. I was no longer obsessed with having "my own" baby. I just wanted to be a mom—now! Learning about adoption made that more of a certainty. We changed our course. Less than a year later, and just weeks after being chosen by a birthmother, we drove to the hospital to meet our son. In the car, I felt that long-forgotten question reemerge. What would our baby look like? Our child was not going to share a genetic link to Erik or to me, so this time around there was no speculation, only curiosity. He was, and is, more beautiful that I could have

imagined. My son, who's now three, has olive skin, huge blue eyes, dark, springy curls, and a sunny smile. His looks garner a lot of attention from friends and strangers alike.

When complimented on my child's appearance, I say "thank you." Secretly, yes, I think he's the most beautiful child who's ever lived. But I had nothing to do with creating his arresting looks. When I admire him, I'm admiring not my genetic

legacy but that of his birthparents. I'm just the grateful recipient of it.

I'm also aware that some of the attention we attract is inspired by something other than my son's striking appearance. I watch people glance at me, then at him, questions showing on their faces. This was brought home to me a few months ago, when I dined out with my brother and his kids. Both of his children bear a clear resemblance to their father, but my nephew, in particular, is a carbon copy of my brother as a child—their

round faces mirror each other. "Well look at him," the waitress commented. "Don't you look just like your daddy?" I realized then that no one would ever say something like that about Ryan and me. Does it matter? No, but it's nonetheless a reminder of what I lost.

Biological parents may be given the gift of seeing themselves in their children's faces. Adoptive parents look for other reflections. I see myself in my child when he kneels beside our old golden retriever, Sandy, gently stroking her and calling her "good dog." The way he mutters, "slow down and try again" (his mommy's mantra) to himself when he's frustrated. The way he loves to read, snuggled in my arms. That's my legacy to him.

It was close to three years of application forms, weekend workshops, and visits with our caseworker before we got the phone call.

"Leah, there are two-year-old twin girls I think you should meet." Two days later, we met them. The possibility of these gorgeous little girls becoming our daughters had both Keith's and my heart racing. After one more visit, they were living at our house.

Keith and I decided to be very open with the girls about how they came into our lives. We started talking about adoption long before they knew what the word meant. We wrote our own little book about their adoption and talked about our adoption journey with


them often.

They loved to hear the story about the first day we met them. It tickles them to hear that we fell in love with them the very first moment we laid eyes on them and how they hid behind the door and peeked at us.

I always ended these little adoption talks with, "Thanks for being mine."

As the girls have grown older, they seem to have fewer questions; adoption is simply the thing that brought the four of us

Adoption By Choice is 20 this year!!! And what a great 20 years it has been!

Looking back, it's wonderful to see how far we've come in helping birth parents and adoptive parents build the kind of open adoption plans that feel right for them. Twenty years ago, when we started this journey into open adoption, there were certainly times when the uncharted waters seemed a little treacherous. Thank goodness we had some very adventurous birth parents and adoptive parents to guide us along the way!

There was Rachel, who gently and patiently taught me that "typical" was not always a good thing, that she was not like "most" birthmoms, and that her adoption plan would probably not look like the "typical" adoption plan. And she was right! Then there was Shelley who was the first birthmom who taught me the importance of having her baby at home with her for a week, so that they could get to know each other before she could say good-bye to being her baby's everyday mom. And Shawna, who moved into the home of the adoptive parents that she had chosen for a week or so before the birth of her daughter, just because they had such a great relationship (they continue to have a great relationship). And there was another Rachel who moved into the adoptive parent's home for a week, at their request, AFTER her daughter's birth, so that there would be an easier transition for the baby.

The adoptive parents we have worked with have been absolutely amazing as well. Twenty years ago, when we started out in open adoption, we were admittedly pretty tentative about being REALLY open. We started out slowly, and didn't push people to be as trusting about open adoption as we might today. Basically, we were more protective of adoptive couples, I think, and needed some unique parents to show us that the boundaries could be pushed out a bit! We have worked with incredible adoptive parents who have warmly welcomed their child's birth families into their lives, and whose children have grown up loving and honoring their birth parents. Parents like Glen and Norma, who encouraged their daughter's birthmom and grandmother to travel to Saskatchewan with baby Natalie to introduce her to their relatives on a weekend visit, without worrying about whether they would see their baby again! And Myles and Lori who invited their birthmom over to help decorate the baby's room together. And Graham and Dean who flew all night across the country to meet their son's birthmom the next day. Then there was Dave and Debi, who travelled over an hour each way to pick up the breast milk that their daughter's birthmom was committed to providing for her. And Dave and Nicki, as well as George and Emilia, who not only met three generations of the birth family when their daughters were born, but have welcomed all of those birth relatives into their lives and the lives of their children.

What else stands out over the past 20 years? The PICNICS every year that are always so much fun. Before the picnics, we used to have Christmas parties, as well as kids' Christmas craft parties, that were delightful. The mini conferences that we have held have also been fantastic, mainly because it is our adoptive families who make up our panels and share their unique experiences, making the conferences so special. The moms and tots groups have also been great. A couple of times, we have brought in guest speakers to present on various topics.

What has not changed over the past 20 years is the thoughtfulness, insight and compassion that birth parents and adoptive parents show as they work together to build an adoption plan that is perfect for the child whose life they are sharing. What has not changed is willingness of people to step outside of their comfort zone, the heart warming generosity of spirit, and the incredible trust, that we see with all of our birth parents and adoptive parents

at ABC. What has not changed is the commitment that every birth parent and every adoptive parent makes, to do what is best for their child, even if it wasn't what they thought they had signed up for.

A year ago, we said farewell to Carol Lamb, who started ABC and built it into the great agency that we have today, and we welcomed Ramone Kindrat, whose enthusiasm and vision will lead us into the next 20 years of open adoption with ABC. We feel so privileged to have been a part of all of your adoption plans, and we love the yearly photos and updates from our adoptive families. We also treasure the updates and photos from our birthmoms, many of whom have kept in touch for the past 20 years!
